

Missouri Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS)

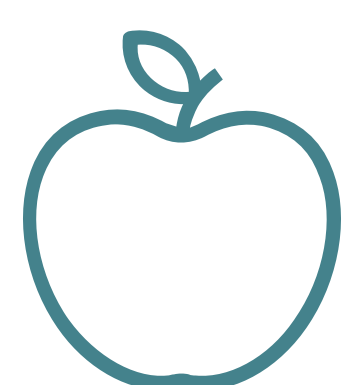

BRFSS is a state based health survey that annually collects information on a range of issues including health conditions, risk behaviors, and preventive practices.

BRFSS is the largest continuously conducted health survey in the world coordinated and partially funded by the CDC.

In Missouri, approximately
7,000
adults are interviewed
throughout the year.

Data is collected on major health topics, including:



Health-related behaviors such as tobacco use, alcohol use, physical activity and nutrition



Chronic health conditions such as diabetes, cancer, arthritis, asthma, and cardiovascular disease



Emerging/high priority health issues such as mental illness, adverse childhood experiences, and influenza-like illness



Health care access, general health, immunizations, and health-related quality of life

Interviews are conducted through random digit dialed telephone interviews using standardized protocols and interviewing methods developed by the CDC. Because the CDC adopted a new weighting methodology in 2011, data collected after 2010 should not be compared to 2010 or previous years.
