Pediatrics Subcommittee Patricia Casey, Vice Chair	<p>Trish reported the pediatric subcommittee met jointly with EMSC today. They had a large number of attendees today, largest this year.</p> <p>Reviewed areas to focus on safe transfer of pediatric patients in an ambulance. The safe transfer flyer will be updated.</p> <p>The group agreed national model guidelines for pediatric patients will be followed</p> <p>Dr. Quay joined the meeting from CMH KC. It is hoped that all regions will have representatives on this subcommittee so there are resources from all areas.</p> <p>A training library is available. Contact Trish for further details.</p> <p>On June 9th tele-training is available. Contact Trish for more information. Patricia.Casey@ssmhealth.com</p> <p>Josh Dugal was given the floor to speak. He talked about the project: 'Right place in the first place.' The three Level I trauma children's hospitals in Missouri agreed on the data points to gather from 2013-2018. Region A and East Central reviewed 25,000 charts and determined that 68% of time a pediatric trauma activation patient goes to the pediatric Level I center from the scene.</p>	<p>Trish Casey will continue to steer the committee projects.</p> <p>Patricia Casey and Liz Kendrick will continue to coordinate both EMSC and the Pediatric Subcommittee meetings.</p>	
Representative Roden	<p>Representative Shane Roden accepted an invitation to speak to the State Advisory Committee about the bill he filed on Paramedic Practitioners.</p> <p>Rep Roden said he has been involved in EMS about 20</p>		


	<p>years. He also participates in MO Task Force I and teaches paramedic classed. He said the average life span of working as paramedics is 13 years.</p> <p>His paramedic practitioner is legislation to give paramedics a way to advance without leaving the field.</p> <p>He made the following points:</p> <p>Legislative language is patterned after Physician Assistant language.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Florida working on bridge program from paramedics to PA.• Representative Roden said he believes medics do not want to uproot families to advance.• Nurses have options but medics have few. Pay disparity is atrocious.• Paramedic work is hard on bodies. Shortage of nurses and medics. Some work in other areas• Representative Roden said he is not worried about having a paramedic practitioner program in MO only. He said it keeps good health care in MO <p>Dr. Stillely says a key issue is being able to pay prehospital personnel an adequate wage if they are to become paramedic practitioners.</p> <p>Representative Rogen said maybe we should explore a bridge program from paramedic to paramedic practitioner</p> <p>In answer to a question, Rep. Roden indicated the government should license military medics as actual paramedics. He would like to be able to take care of the military.</p> <p>Follow up note: See the summer edition of the EMS magazine for further comments and an interview with Rep. Trauma Subcommittee Dr. David Gustafson, Chair</p>	<p>Dr. Gustafson reporting as Chairperson of the Trauma Committee:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The right place in the first place was discussed with Pediatric trauma nurses. Dr. Gustafson says this opens the door with all trauma pts. • Hospitals getting prehospital reports is an ongoing problem. • Sometimes data difficult to gather because info refused based on HIPAA. About 13% of patients who have secondary transports won't give info. • Pam Jackson said there was discussion on the best way to get initial scene transport. Not easy to get it when there is a stop at an outlying hospital before the patient is transferred to a Level I or Level II Trauma Center. • Terry said regs were adjusted 19- 20 years ago so the ambulance not bound by law to leave run tickets. He is open to having a more fluid system to gather information. He will check with the vendor and lawyers to see if something can be worked out. • Dr. Sabina Braithwaite said in East Central Region, some people are able to integrate some of the info between EMS and hospitals as an interim method. • Dr. Andrews said TCD data also needs to be addressed. Maybe regional is the way to handle things

TCD, Paramedic Practitioner and 911 have been the focus.</p> <p>TCD—Trauma, STEMI and Strokes nurse coordinators have their part to do with the respective regulatory language. Needed changes should be identified. DHSS will be sending a letter regarding the rewrite of the regs to the appropriate people regarding Trauma, STEMI and Stroke regulatory language and suggested changes. The Office of Emergency Care has been suggested and would include the TCD</p>
