Tuberculosis Awareness Suggestions for Promoting World TB Day

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS), Bureau of Communicable Disease Control and Prevention would like to provide local public health agencies resources that can be used for tuberculosis (TB) awareness in concert with March 24th World TB Day and throughout the year.

Below is a list of educational activities that can help send these important health messages. Some activities are easy such as maintaining educational materials at your health department, while others will take more time and resources. There may be other groups in your community who would be interested in partnering with you on some of the activities. Optional Educational Activities

- <u>Send a letter</u> (Attachment C) or visit local physician offices to make them aware of preventing and controlling the spread of tuberculosis.
- Email a <u>TB e-card</u> to physicians at the local hospital(s).
- Design a TB awareness bulletin board display at your health department with a receptacle to give away free TB bookmarks.

- Provide educational resources on TB awareness and control to:
 - local hospitals
 - veterans hospitals
 - physician offices
 - child care facilities
 - home health agencies
 - long term care facilities
 - shelters
 - food pantries
 - college student health offices
 - refugee organizations
 - minority health organizations
 - senior centers
- Give presentations and supply educational resources to your local senior citizen centers, chamber of commerce, community centers, Red Cross, and other organizations.
- Contact local manufacturing entities such as meat-packing, construction and roofing companies to provide TB awareness posters and bookmarks.
- Work with the local faith community to distribute TB awareness resources to staff and congregants.
- Contact the health teacher and school nurses with the local school system and ask them to encourage teachers to do projects on TB awareness.
- Contact any of the suggested organizations above to see if the local health department could sponsor a program on TB awareness.
